
THE EPIPHANY

SAFER INTERNET DAY

CHILDREN'S MENTAL HEALTH WEEK

St. Bede's Catholic Junior School will again be supporting Children's Mental Health Week this year. This will take place on 5th – 9th February, with the theme of 'My Voice Matters'.

Every child has the right to express their views, feelings and wishes in all matters affecting them, and to have their views considered and taken seriously. We feel it is important to empower children and young people, and provide them with time, space, and opportunities to express themselves.

Empowering children and young people can have a positive impact on their health and wellbeing. For example, children and young people who feel that their voices are heard - and that what they say makes a difference - have higher levels of self-efficacy and self-esteem. They also have a greater sense of community – and as people become empowered, they can work together to create positive changes for themselves and for others.

Throughout the week the children will be taking part in an assembly and lessons which endeavour to encourage them all, whoever they are, to believe that their voice matters.

Talking about our mental health, and removing any taboos, is key for

children's wellbeing, so here are some suggested conversation starters to try out with your child:

- Tell me about your day.
- What has been the best thing today?
- What is your online life like?
- What is your biggest worry right now?
- What could I do to help you?

ARCHDIOCESE OF LIVERPOOL BUILDING FUND

We need to preserve Catholic education for future generations and one of the ways that we can do this is by ensuring that Catholic schools are maintained and supported. A payment of £10 per family for the Archdiocese of Liverpool Building Fund enables the Archdiocese to do approximately £5 million worth of building work each year, when Government grants are taken into account. Every £150 shortfall, however, means £1,000 worth of work cannot be undertaken.

Parents/carers are requested by the Diocese to make a contribution of £10 per family per year. This year we need a total of £2,620. This can be paid in the usual way of the School Gateway. Please contact the office if you have any trouble with this. Previously we have organised the Easter raffle to raise this amount and we are thankful for every contribution and for each raffle ticket purchased. However, we realise that this is not always an easy ask for families to sell £10 of raffle tickets; therefore, this year, we will move the fundraising event to the Summer Term and intend to organise a sponsored Colour Run in Victoria Park following the success of the Santa dash in December. The Parent/Carer Forum discussed this event at the last meeting and have some fantastic ideas which pupils and parents/carers will love!

LENTEN PRAYER & WORSHIP

Father Mark will say a mass for the start of Lent on <u>Thursday 22nd February</u>. As we are not in school for Ash Wednesday, Father Mark has offered to support the children on their journeys through Lent. The <u>Mass starts at</u> 2.00pm and all parents/carers are welcome.

Year 6 Heights & Measures

Every year in England, children in reception and Y6 have their height and weight checked at school as part of the National Child Measurement Programme. Measurements are used to calculate weight status. This information builds a picture of how children are growing and helps plan better health and leisure services for families. Your child's class will take part in this year's programme on Wednesday 24th January.

WHO SHOULD I SPEAK TO?

We realise that there may be times when you need to speak to a member of school staff. To help parents/carers know who is best to speak to, we have devised a quick overview. There is a 'graduated approach' in school as many queries can be dealt with by the school office and/or class teachers. This means that queries can be resolved by the right person effectively and efficiently. Staff are always available at the door and pupil diaries should be used to record quick messages. Teaching staff are not always able to respond to emails each day as they have a full teaching timetable; moreover, senior staff, such as Mrs. Geoghegan, Mrs. Lloyd-Green and Mrs. Tiernan are not always the first—nor the best—people to speak to regarding issues such as extra-curricular or specific classroom issues.

Issues related to learning, friendships/fallouts, homework, minor pastoral needs = Class Teachers

Queries regarding absence, appointments, dates, extra-curricular = School Office

Pastoral Needs: On-going friendship problems, family changes, bereavements = Mrs. Harrington

Behaviour, Safeguarding and additional support (non-SEND) for learning = Mrs. Geoghegan

SEND queries specific to a child; concerns re: learning and potential SEND = Mrs. Lloyd-Green

Concerns that have not be remedied/addressed; bullying; complex problems and any concerns regarding the curriculum; teaching/learning and school staff.

WORLD BOOK DAY FUN: GET YOUR OUTFITS READY!

Our reading strategy is to promote reading for pleasure, offering every pupil the opportunity to have a wide range of books to read. Reading for pleasure is the single biggest indicator of a child's future success – more than their family circumstances, their parents' educational background or their income. We want to see all children develop a life-long habit of reading for pleasure and the improved life chances this brings them.

We will next be celebrating World Book Day on 7 March 2024, and I am sure you will be delighted to know that this year pupils are able to dress up as their favourite book character. There will be a whole school assembly when pupils can show their outfits and books; however, the focus of the day will be on six special elements to create one

special reading superpower!

1: Being read to regularly

2: Having books at home and at school

3: Having a choice in what to read

4: Finding time to read

5: Having trusted help to find a book

6: Making reading FUN!



PAYMENT FOR SCHOOL MEALS

Please remember, school meals must be paid for, in advance, via the School Gateway app. This is because the school is charged, on a daily basis, by Halton Borough Council for every meal provided. As you will appreciate, if each outstanding payment of £2.70 is multiplied by the number of children who take a school dinner, the DAILY arrears could exceed £500.

In line with Halton Borough Council's policy, you may be contacted daily by the school office when arrears reach £13.50 (five dinners). A letter will also be sent at the end of the week to any parent/carers whose account is in arrears, regardless of amount outstanding.

Whilst I realise that letters and telephone calls regarding smaller arrears can be seen as a nuisance I hope we can rely on your co-operation to minimise the work that this entails by ensuring that all payments are received <u>in advance</u>. I appreciate that this may be an oversight.

The school currently has arrears totalling £1471.21. This equates to approximately 500 school meals unpaid for.

Note that any child with an outstanding balance over £13.50, will need to be provided with a packed lunch, until the arrears are settled. If this is not the case, we will only be able to provide them with the HBC minimum requirement of a sandwich and a piece of fruit and you will still be charged £2.50. Please maintain contact with the school office as we are here to help you and ensure that your child receives a quality meal every day. If any parent/carer is in need of support, please contact Mrs. Tiernan who can assist in dinner money arrears and any other issues impacting on this area.

Once you have completed an application we will be able to check your child's status. The system will regularly check the status of all pupils not entitled to FSM so, if your circumstances change, the school will be advised without you having visit Halton Direct Link to make an application.
